## **Code of Conduct**

The Organizer Committee of the I Congreso & XII Jornadas de Usuarios de R is committed to providing a welcoming and harassment-free experience for everyone, regardless of gender, gender identity and expression, age, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, body size, race, ethnicity, religion (or lack thereof), or technology choices. We do not tolerate harassment of conference participants in any form. Unconf participants violating these rules may be sanctioned or expelled from the event at the discretion of the conference organizers.

This code of conduct applies to all participants, including the Organizer and Scientific Committees and applies to all modes of interaction, both in-person and online, including GitHub project repos, the discussion forum, Slack channels and Twitter.

## Conference participants agree to:

If you feel that someone has harassed you or otherwise treated you inappropriately, please alert any member of the conference team in person.
- Take care of each other. Alert a member of the conference team
  if you notice a dangerous situation, someone in distress, or
  violations of this code of conduct, even if they seem
  inconsequential.
- It is not allowed the use of images (photos or film) of a person delivering an oral communication without their permission.
